## Education

#### **Trainings & Outreach Activities**

Each year, the staff at Prevent Child Abuse Nevada (PCANV) participates in various community events to collaborate with other organizations and raise awareness on important topics like positive parenting, anti-bullying strategies, internet safety, and stress reduction. This year, PCANV took part in 14 events, including back-to-school fairs, fall and spring carnivals, conferences, and several holiday celebrations.

Additionally, PCANV offers 10 different training programs for professionals and parents focused on strategies to enhance the well-being of children in our communities. This year, staff conducted 32 training sessions statewide, involving 173 providers and 37 parents.



Finally, PCANV strives to maintain an active online presence to stay connected with the statewide community. Over the past year, the organization has worked to enhance its community engagement by regularly updating its social media pages (facebook.com/pcanv and Instagram @pcanevada), keeping its chapter website current, and distributing its quarterly newsletter.





### Community Collaboration

#### Parent Wellness Tele-visit Pilot Program

From July 2022 to July 2024, the Nevada Institute for Children's Research and Policy (NICRP) collaborated with the University Medical Center of Southern Nevada (UMC) on a pilot program funded by the United Healthcare - Empowering Health Behavioral Health grant. The Parent Wellness Tele-visit Program offered telephonic support to parents recently discharged from the hospital after childbirth. The program aimed to provide emotional support, answer questions, and connect parents to additional community services, helping them manage stress and thrive as new caregivers.



During the planning stage, NICRP developed and

translated program materials with input from various parent groups and trained hospital staff on the enrollment process. The program officially launched in March 2023, with 544 unique enrollment forms received by November 2023. Successful connections were made with 52% of families. The program demonstrated positive outcomes, with over 70% of participants who completed the program reporting improved resiliency, parenting skills, and coping abilities. All parents who completed the post-survey expressed satisfaction with the program.

Parent feedback on the program was widely positive, with many parents expressing their gratitude for the early connection to information and resources. NICRP also had the opportunity to provide support with high-need items thanks to the support of community partners and donations. A total of 48 families were able to receive items such as baby clothing, formula, strollers, and others. A total of 20 families were also referred to community agencies for additional support. The pilot program helped increase our understanding of the importance of early connections with new parents and the needs of caregivers of a newborn.

#### **Essentials for Childhood**

In October 2023, researchers from the University of Nevada, Reno, and the University of Nevada, Las Vegas Schools of Public Health received a \$2.5 million grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to address and prevent adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) in Nevada. This five-year grant will focus on enhancing surveillance infrastructure, implementing and sustaining ACEs prevention strategies, and utilizing data on both ACEs and positive childhood experiences (PCEs) to drive impactful actions. These initiatives aim to reduce leading causes of death, mental health issues, health risk behaviors such as substance abuse, and documented cases of child abuse and neglect.

#### Parent Advisory Group

This year, PCANV successfully expanded the Parent Advisory Group, which now includes 8 members from various parts of Nevada, such as Clark, Fallon, and Washoe County. These parents, guardians, and caregivers have played a crucial role in providing guidance and feedback on programs and materials designed to enhance prevention efforts in the state. Their contributions included participating in feedback sessions on campaign materials aimed at reducing stigma around seeking parental help, engaging in trainings on Toxic Stress, and learning about Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse and Neglect. Additionally, the parent advisory group members were involved in reviewing and evaluating applications for family services programs submitted by government and nonprofit organizations to ensure the delivery of high-quality family services.

#### **Biannual Webinar**

Each year, PCANV aims to keep community members informed with the latest information and resources through two webinars. In February 2024, the Las Vegas Urban League Early Childhood Connection hosted the first webinar, titled "Strengthening Families: Increasing Awareness of the Whole Child to Prevent Maltreatment." This training is based on the philosophy of child development and the whole child. Participants gained a further understanding of adverse childhood experiences and how children may express trauma in early childhood education settings. Using knowledge of child development from the whole child approach, participants will



understand how trauma affects all aspects of children's lives and how parents, caregivers and professionals can use this awareness to implement support services, programs, and strategies to help prevent child maltreatment and better support families.

The second webinar took place in May 2024, presented by Nevada Child Seekers, and focused on internet safety and abduction prevention. Nevada Child Seekers collaborates with law enforcement to keep children safe. Many crimes against children are committed through the internet and many missing child cases begin with something that happened online rather than offline. As technology advances, it can be difficult for parents to keep up. This webinar showed the latest dangers and the most update internet resources to keep kids safe.

## Awareness

#### **Pinwheels for Prevention**

Prevent Child Abuse America Pinwheels for Prevention® campaign is an effort to change the way the nation thinks about prevention and introduce how everyone can deliver on their commitment to America's children. The blue pinwheel is meant to be an uplifting reminder of childhoods and the bright future all children deserve. The 2024 "Pinwheels for Prevention" activities were a statewide success! Overall, 8 counties reported their participation in **APPROXIMATELY 60 PINWHEELS FOR PREVENTION EVENTS**, involving school teachers, organizations, children and parents either planting pinwheels in the parks, courthouse lawns, or displaying them and sharing the pinwheel message.
